1. Review and Approve MetroTAC Action Minutes for the Meeting of April 15, 2015

Vice Chair Dennis Davies moved approval of the April 15, 2015 minutes. The motion was seconded by Mike Obermiller and the minutes were approved unanimously.

2. Metro Commission/JPA Board Meeting Recap (Standing Item)

- Chairman Humora reviewed the May meeting of the Metro Commission/JPA.
- The Commission unanimously approved and accepted the following items:
 - o The June 30, 2013 JPA audit
 - The FYE 2013 mid-year review
 - The 2015 to 2017 As Needed Contract
- Vice Chair Jerry Jones will be an alternate on the Finance Committee
- Chairman Humora discussed the schedule for the special meeting and tour of the Point Loma WWTP and holding a strategic planning meeting at the Plant. The Commission Meeting would only be an hour and the rest of the time would be spent on strategic planning and the tour. The meeting will be held on June 4, 2015. The Commission agreed and approved the Plan.
- Chairman Humora gave an update on the Point Lomas Permit Renewal and the Pure Water Program.

3. Presentation: Cost Allocation Subgroup

Lee Ann Jones Santos and Chairman Humora presented the draft work product of the Cost Allocation Subgroup that has been meeting since January 2013 on a regular basis. A copy of the presentation is included as Attachment A to these minutes. The Subgroup has allocated Pure

Water Program capital costs between water and wastewater facilities based on the type of facility. Slide 12 of the presentation shows the current cost allocations with the North City 15 MGD alternative from the Recycled Water Study. Slide 14 and 15 show the costs, benefits, and risks of PLWTP wastewater options. MWH, the Program Manager, is currently reviewing and updating the costs from the Recycled Water Study and looking at other option. These should be known within the next month. The Cost Allocation Subcommittee is currently working on revenue sharing options from the Pure Water Sales. It is possible that if an agency wants to pay both the wastewater costs as well as a proportionate amount of the water costs that they could gain their share of the water produced. There will need to be a revised Regional Disposal Agreement and this process might start in December 2015.

4. ACTION: FYE 2016 City of San Diego Metro Project

Seth Gates provided an updated budget presentation hand out (Attachment B to these minutes). The following are the budget highlights:

Revenue

Decrease of \$13.3 million in State Revolving Fund loan reimbursements

Expense

Increase of \$4.5 million in Energy and Utilities costs due primarily to SDG&E rate increases due to San Onofre retirement and compounding approved rate increases)

Increase of \$4.9 million in State Revolving Loan repayments, ongoing maintenance & repairs Decrease of \$4.9 million in one-time expense and contracts expense realignment

Decrease of \$1.2 million due to reallocations

Decrease of 5.09 FTE's (net) primarily associated with the re-allocations

The Metro TAC unanimously agreed to move this item forward to the Finance Committee and the Metro Commission/JPA for their review and possible acceptance.

5. ACTION: Billing Issues Reconciliation

Edgar Patino handed out an updated spreadsheet from the one in the agenda packet showing the reconciliation of all billing issues from 2007 to 2012. A copy of this spreadsheet is included as Attachment C. The following are the major highlights that were reviewed by Edgar Patino and Karyn Keese:

- Fiscal Year 2009 2012 Year Exhibit E Year End Reconciliations (True-ups) are included
- Operating Reserve Payments for Fiscal Year 2010 & 2011 are included
- Padre Dam Overbilling Correction starting with Fiscal Year 2007 is included
- North City Recycled Water Issue Adjustment starting with Fiscal Year 2009 is included
- Payments will be distributed by the City to PA's by June 30, 2015

On a motion by Chairman Humora and seconded by Eric Minicilli the Metro TAC unanimously accepted and approved the reconciliation and agreed to move this item on to the Finance Committee and the Metro Commission/JPA for their review and possible acceptance.

6. ACTION; South Bay Recycled Water Revenues

Edgar Patino handed out the final spreadsheets showing the allocation to each PA of the revenue received from recycled water starting in 2009 to 2014.A copy of this is included as Attachment D. These numbers are based on County Water Authority audited numbers of recycled water sales less the water department's operational expenses. On a motion by Vice Chair Davies and seconded by Eric Minicilli the Metro TAC unanimously accepted and approved the recycled water reconciliation and agreed to move this item on to the Finance Committee and the Metro Commission/JPA for their review and possible acceptance.

7. ACTION: Consideration and Possible Action to Recommend Approval of the FY 2015-2016 Atkins Contract

Items 7 and 8 were taken up as one item. Karyn Keese announced that she will be retiring from Atkins as of July 1, 2015 but not from the JPA. When she started working for the JPA she had her own firm and will now be going back to this. The spreadsheet provided in the agenda packet outlined the split of the contract between Atkins and The Keze Group (TKG). Scott Tulloch will remain at Atkins and his budget has increased from \$29,606 to \$40,000 due to anticipated needs in the next fiscal year due to cost allocation presentations to PAs and accelerated Pure Water Program Costs. His hourly rate remains the same. TKG has decreased their hourly rate from the standard Atkins billing rate and has decreased their hours for Exhibit E auditing because only two years will be under audit. The net effect of the split of the contract is a decrease of \$3,600 for the upcoming fiscal year. On a motion by Vice Chair Davies, seconded by Vive Chair Lau the Items 7 and 8 were approved and recommended they should be moved on to the Metro Finance Committee and Metro Commission/JPA for their review and potential acceptance.

8. ACTION: Consideration and Possible Action to Recommend Approval of the FY 2015-2016 The Keze Group LLC Contract

ACTION; Consideration and Possible Action to Recommend Approval of the FY-2015-2016 Treasurers Contract

Karyn Keese reviewed the annual amendment to the Treasurers' Contract. The only change to the contract is adding some additional dollars as discussed in Item 10 for the facilitation on the JPA Audit. On a motion by Chairman Humora, seconded by ______ the Amendment to the Treasurers Contract was approved and recommended it should be moved on to the Finance Committee and Metro Commission/JPA for their review and potential acceptance.

ACIOM; Consideration and Possible Action to Recommend Approval of the FY 2015-2016 Metro Wastewater JPA Budget

Karyn Keese reviewed the proposed Metro Commission/JPA budget. The only change is that money has been added for the two-year JPA audit both for Padre Dam's management of the audit and the auditor's fees which will cover FYE 2014 and FYE 2015. On a motion by Chairman Humora, seconded by Eric Minicilli the Metro Commission/JPA 2016 budget was approved and recommended it should be moved on to the Finance Committee and Metro Commission/JPA for their review and potential acceptance.

11. Metro Wastewater Update (Standing Item)

The timing for the June 4th meeting was discussed. Vans will leave MOC II at 9AM as there is limited parking at Point Loma. The JPA meeting will start at 10:00 and will last between one-half to one hour followed by new member orientation, strategic planning, and a tour of the facility. Estimated return time is 2:00 back at MOC.

12. Metro Capital Improvement Program and Funding Sources (Standing Item).

Tung Phung reviewed the 2nd and 3rd quarterly updates of the CIP. Included as Attachment E. Cumulative expenditures year to date are \$12, 4 million and are tracking very close to projected.

13. Financial Update

There was no financial update this month.

14. MetroTAC Work Plan (Standing Item)

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15. Point Loma Permit Renewal

Chairman Humora reviewed the key milestones attached to the agenda. The Mayor has directed staff to pursue the EPA administrative fix and to see if this can be accomplished with EPA staff by the end of June.

16. Review of Items to be Brought Forward to the next Metro Commission/Metro JPA Meeting (June 4, 2015)

Chairman Humora recommended Items 4 to 10 be moved forward to the Finance Committee and Metro Commission for their review and potential approval.

17. Other Business of Metro TAC

There was no other business of the Metro TAC.

18. Adjournment (To the next Regular Meeting, June 17, 2015)






FY2015 Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) – 2nd and 3rd Quarters

The Public Utilities Department hereby submits the FY2015 CIP updates for the period of October 1, 2014 to March 31, 2015.

This quarterly report includes project highlights, forecast versus actual expenditures report, and project change orders.

CIP PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant Grit Processing Improvements Project




New Grit Processing Facility 75% Complete.

The Grit Processing Improvements Project (GIP) at the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant (PLWWTP) consists of reconstruction of the south grit tanks and its adjacent pump gallery, replacement of the existing grit processing headworks building (1962) with an odor controlled, drive through facility and new grit processing equipment.

This project will increase grit removal efficiency. Adequacy of the grit removal is a major concern because of the wear and tear the grit material causes on the downstream equipment and the decrease in treatment capacity and efficiency. The material also affects the operations, maintenance and performance at the Metro Biosolids Center.

Construction began in March 2011. Budget and schedule were impacted due to unforeseen conditions, construction challenges and increase in construction scope. The construction completion was extended to September 2015. The total cost of this project is approximately \$35.6 million.

Elevation Plan


Pump Station 2 (PS2) is the largest Metro sewer pump station that receives wastewater flows from both the North Metro Interceptor which serves the northern San Diego region and the South Metro Interceptor which serves the southern communities of San Diego. This station pumps sewage to the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant. Thus the power reliability of PS2 is of utmost importance to the operation and reliability of the overall wastewater system.

The project scope consists of the construction of new buildings to house 4 generators and a diesel fuel tank. This project will improve the power reliability of this station and will meet the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) guidelines to provide 100% of the power requirements for the station from two separate and independent sources of electric power to prevent any power supply interruption to this station. The independent plant-based electrical generators will provide force main surge protection during the station's operation and in the event of a total power failure.

The original scope was modified to increase the size of the diesel generators and development of a generator probability analysis to calculate the probability of electrical failure and the associated impact to the pump station. Additional scope also includes modifications to the 2nd floor of the switchgear building to provide new office space that meets the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), refurbishment of sewage heat exchangers to provide cooling of the new generators, a three dimensional (3D) analytical model of the proposed ventilation system of the new generator building, relocation of existing fiber optic and conduits that are conflicting with the new generator building, modifications to the existing engine room to house variable frequency drives, modifications to the existing medium voltage switchgear for high resistance grounding to minimize arc flash, and replacement of the existing landscaping with drought tolerant landscaping.

The schedule and cost estimate were adjusted to account for the additional work. Design is scheduled to be completed in the spring of 2015. Construction will start in summer of 2015 and is scheduled to be completed in spring of 2019. The estimated total project cost is \$43 million.

METRO JPA/TAC Staff Report

Subject Title: Authorization to execute a contract with JCI Jones Chemical Inc., to provide sodium hypochlorite for Wastewater Facilities in the Public Utilities Department.

Requested Action: Sodium Hypochlorite (bleach) is a chemical used to disinfect wastewater and treat odors generated during the various wastewater treatment processes. The use of this chemical is required by the Regional Water Quality Control Board for disinfection of treated wastewater and by the Air Pollution Control District to treat odors at our wastewater facilities.

The Public Utilities Wastewater Treatment and Disposal Division (WWTD) completed a scientific evaluation in July 2014 of the effective use of the bleach on the treated wastewater (effluent) at the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant and determined that a reduction in the volume of chemical used is appropriate at this time. More than 5 years of ocean monitoring data showed that effective disinfection of the effluent was achieved at lower concentrations. These lower concentrations of bleach in the effluent would continue to provide effective protection of human health, and would be a further benefit to the marine environment along with an estimated cost savings of \$6,500,000 annually.

WWTD also looked into the opportunity to use a higher concentrated bleach product (16% concentration) for the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant which would provide savings in transportation costs due to fewer deliveries. The facility will transition to the higher concentration as the storage tanks and associated equipment are certified to handle the higher concentrated chemical.

With the reduction in the chemical volume needed, WWTD pursued the consolidation of the two existing bleach contracts (JCI Jones Chemicals Inc.(JCI Jones) and Olin Chlor Alkali Products (Olin) each serving different WWTD facilities) to achieve the best pricing. With the limited number of companies able to provide this industrial chemical, at the purity standards required and in the volume needed, only these same two companies participated in the bid process.

This action is to execute a contract with JCI Jones to furnish the City of San Diego, Public Utilities Department with sodium hypochlorite for one (1) year and with options to renew four (4) additional one-year periods for a not to exceed amount of \$17,900,924. JCI Jones had the lowest cost of the two (2) responsive and responsible bidders with \$0.59 per gallon for the bleach with a 12.5% concentration and \$0.67 per gallon for bleach with a 16% concentration. With the consolidation of the contracts through this bidding process, a 3% and 19% reduction in the 12.5% concentration price per gallon was achieved.

JCI Jones has been a very responsible and responsive company for over 5 years serving the Metro Biosolids Center, and North City and South Bay Water Reclamation Plants. The company was flexible and accommodated our varying delivery needs. WWTD has full confidence that JCI Jones will continue to be a reliable vendor now providing bleach to all the WWTD facilities.

The Council, by Resolution R-305840, adopted May 27, 2010, approved a phase-funded contract with Olin Corporation dba Olin Chlor Alkali Products (Olin) with a contract duration of one year, with four additional one year options for the provision of sodium hypochlorite at the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant for the purpose of wastewater disinfection and odor control for an amount not to exceed \$3,905,000. R-

305840 required the City's Public Utilities Department (Department) to obtain Council authorization prior to exercising an option to extend the contract for each additional one year period and to authorize an increase in the per unit cost not to exceed 20%. Due to an administrative oversight, option years two through four did not receive Council approval prior to extension of the contract and increase in unit price. With this understanding, WWTD is respectfully requesting retroactive approval for the expended amount of \$10,392,224 on the past Olin contract, Resolution (R-305840) for the second through fourth option years.

At the time when these contracts were promulgated in approximately 2010, the procurement strategy was to split the bleach commodity in to two separate contracts to meet the needs of WWTD. The administrative oversight in continuing to use the Olin contract past the first option year is attributed to a turnover in staff, along with the complication of the commodity being split into two contracts and the respective Council resolutions applied different contract renewal terms. As time passed, staff executed both the Olin and JCI Jones contracts as if the renewal terms were identical with each contract being authorized for the full five years.

Upon the determination in 2014 that the Olin Contract did not have City Council approval past the first contract option year, the use of that contract was halted, an intermediate cooperative contract was created, and all of the chemical needs were bundled into one scope of work for a bidding process. This action is the outcome of that bidding process.

WWTD is presently utilizing a cooperative agreement that was executed on October 28, 2014 with Olin. This agreement provides a 3% reduction in the unit pricing (\$0.59 per gallon for 12% bleach) from the previous Olin contract (R-305840). We will continue to use this cooperative agreement until August 31, 2015 while we seek Council approval for the new JCI Jones contract for FY2016 – FY2020.

Recommendations: Approve the resolutions.

METRO JPA/TAC Staff Report

Subject Title: Authorization to execute a contract with Hawthorne Power Systems to provide technical services and parts for Caterpillar engine generators and switch gears for Wastewater Facilities in the Public Utilities Department.

Requested Action: The Wastewater Treatment and Disposal Division (WWTD) of the Public Utilities Department (PUD) requests approval to award a contract to Hawthorne Power Systems (Hawthorne). The proposed contract provides technical services and parts for Caterpillar engine generators and electrical switch gears.

PUD currently owns and operates fourteen (14) Caterpillar large engine generators along with eight (8) smaller emergency backup power generator units and the associated electrical switchgears that are located at thirteen (13) PUD facilities. The fourteen (14) engine generators have varying purposes which include creating electricity that is used to power facilities, operate large pumps to transport wastewater for treatment, or provide adequate backup power to support large facility operations. The proper operation and reliability of these large engine generators is key to achieving approximately \$19,110 of electrical savings per day as well as receiving \$1,500,000 in revenue, during fiscal year 2014, for excess power sold to the local utility.

Two of these large engines have a critical task of each operating a large pump at our main wastewater pump station on Harbor Drive. These two engines operate on natural gas which provides significant electrical savings each day as well as protect the pump station during a power outage from wastewater surging back through the station and releasing to the environment.

The eight (8) smaller emergency backup power generator units provide power during a power outage to critical areas of a facility to ensure preservation of operational activities until utility power resumes. An example of their importance was demonstrated during a 2011 commercial power outage that lasted for 11 hours. In 2011, PUD had a few pump stations that had not yet been outfitted with backup generators for operational power. At the end of the power outage, more than 2 million gallons of sewage was released into the ocean and more than 10 miles of San Diego County shoreline was closed. The California Regional Water Quality Control Board Region San Diego (RWQCB) required PUD to pay more than \$17 million in fines and penalty offsets, which included purchasing generators for those pump stations which are now covered in this new contract.

An Invitation to Bid (ITB), No. 10054458-15-E for Technical Services and Parts for Caterpillar Engine Generators and Switchgears, was issued by Purchasing & Contracting Department on March 18, 2015. Five companies downloaded the bid from the City's third party provider, who is responsible for announcing and distributing all City solicitations. Hawthorne was the only company that submitted a bid in response to the ITB.

Hawthorne has been a responsible and responsive company providing reliable service to WWTD for more than five years. The company was accommodating with our varying requirements to meet the needs of the facilities. WWTD has full confidence that Hawthorne will continue to be a reliable vendor providing parts and service as needed.
