Award of Sodium Hypochlorite Purchase Contract at Various Wastewater Treatment and Disposal Facilities

Presenter: Pamela Galan, Supervising Management Analyst, Wastewater Treatment and Disposal Division

The Public Utilities Department submits for approval a request for authorization to purchase sodium hypochlorite for use at the North City Water Reclamation Plant, South Bay Water Reclamation Plant, Metropolitan Biosolids Center, Pump Station 1, Pump Station 2, Pump Station 64, Pump Station 65, and the Peñasquitos Pump Station. This chemical is used for odor control at these facilities. The Department requests purchases of approximately 1,266,000 gallons annually at a per gallon cost of \$0.6043. The estimated annual pre-tax expenditure is \$765,000.

Background

Sodium hypochlorite is a chemical used, among others, to control odors at wastewater treatment facilities. This request would authorize sodium hypochlorite purchases to allow the Department to maintain sufficient chemical volume to meet anticipate odor control needs. The proposed vendor is JCI Jones Chemicals, Inc. under the terms of Bid No. 9938-10-C. Please note that this request is distinct from a similar request for authorization to purchase sodium hypochlorite for the Point Loma Wastewater Treatment Plant. That request was recently approved by the Metro Commission and by the San Diego City Council. This request would meet the sodium hypochlorite needs of all other Wastewater Treatment and Disposal Division Facilities.
